

# Voting teams coming to you for the federal election

A voting team from the Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) will be visiting your local community to enable you to vote in the federal election.

If you are visiting one of these communities and will not be home on election day, you can vote when the voting team visits. You can also vote before election day at an early voting centre, or at an interstate voting centre on election day.

Remember, you must be enrolled to vote, and if you're enrolled, voting is compulsory.

If you will not be able to attend one of the centres listed below you should contact the AEC for information on how you can vote.

# Freedom for needy kids

PEOPLE from all walks of life will take on a six-day trek to raise money for children who struggle to take a few steps.

The eclectic group of 12 South Australians, aged between 20 and 60, include a farmer, full-time mum and a business executive. They will trek from Port Adelaide to Port Lincoln in October for Variety's Kickin4Kids campaign. The campaign has raised about \$600,000 in the past three years for wheelchairs, leg

splints, standing frames, prosthetics and other devices to help children gain mobility, freedom and independence.

The trek will be hosted by Channel 9 presenter Troy Gray, who will film a documentary along the way.

“We're out there doing these things because the kids can't,” Gray said. “It's not just the children who benefit from this but also their family as well because they gain more independence - you just get blown away by the impact it has.”

Investment adviser Adam Boon said he was trekking to give something to kids less fortunate than himself. “A lot of these kids can't even put two steps down let alone a three to four-hour trek,” he said.

Mental health worker and mother-of-three, Jo Atkinson, said: “I know the government doesn't give a lot to these things and I know how hard it is being a mum of three with not a lot of money.”

**LAMBS:** Yarded: 9500. A similar sized mixed quality yarding of crossbred and Merino lambs sold to fluctuating competition, provided by the usual buyers. They operated on a large selection of new season crossbreds at similar rates to the previous week. Quality light and trade weight crossbreds sold to dearer values with heavy-weight lambs in demand at dearer rates. A large selection of new season trade weight lambs saw prices ease. Merino lambs were plentiful and demand from restockers and feeders continued at unchanged levels, trade weight Merinos lifted marginally and heavyweights eased.

More new season crossbred lambs were yarded, lightweight 2 scores sold to feeders from \$79 to \$83, while the lightweight 3 scores returned \$82 to \$87/head. Trade weight 4 scores eased \$7/head to average 513c/kg cwt.

Lightweight old lambs to feeders from \$72 to \$82, with 3 score light trade weight old lambs lifted and sold from \$110 to \$130/head averaging 504c/kg cwt. The 4 score trade weights lifted \$4 averaging 488c and a small penning of heavyweight 4 score crossbreds lifted \$8/head to average 527c/kg cwt.

at unchanged rates returning \$72 to \$81/head.

Trade weight 3 scores eased \$1 and averaged 458c/kg and the heavyweight 3 scores returned \$115 to \$132/head to average 425c/kg cwt. Heavyweight 4 score crossbred hoggets sold from \$104 to \$113, whilst heavyweight 3 score Merinos returned \$100 to \$122/head.

**SHEEP.** Yarded: 2500. A similar size sheep yarding sold to mixed competition supplied by the usual trade and processor buyers. Lightweight 2 score ewes made from \$65 to \$74/head to average 411c/kg cwt. Heavyweight 3 score ewes sold from \$90 to \$126/head to average 373c/kg cwt. Wethers were again in short supply, medium weight 3 scores averaged 392c, and heavyweight 3 scores made from \$102 to \$131/head to average 363c/kg cwt. Heavyweight 3 score Merino rams sold from \$95 to \$118/head.

**CATTLE.** Yarded: 1000. A much larger yarding of young cattle that featured some very good consignments of supplementary fed

yearlings sold to stronger competition provided by the usual buyers with the addition of an extra Victorian operator. Feeder buyers purchased lightweight vealers and yearlings and were particularly prominent on the good selection of lightweight bulls available. Vealer steers and heifers sold up to last week's strong rates, prime yearlings were in demand and heifers lifted substantially and grown steers and heifers lifted in the wake of the extra competition. Cows were plentiful and apart from types suitable for restockers and feeders, values eased and bulls attracted significant interest and prices lifted accordingly.

Vealers were more plentiful and feeder buyers were keen to secure lightweight steers at 199c and the equivalent heifers at 185c/kg. Steers sold to small butchers and wholesalers from 198c to 221c and heifers returned 203c to 218c/kg.

Lightweight C2 yearling steers suitable for feeder buyers eased marginally and returned 171c to 189c, lightweight C2 heifers lifted 8c

and sold from 163c to 186c/kg. Several drafts of pastoral bred cattle were yarded, C3 steers sold from 155c to 167c and D3 heifers returned 140c to 161c/kg. Lightweight B3 steers sold from 183c to 208c and averaged 193c, lightweight C3 steers lifted 7c and averaged 182c and heavyweight B3 steers averaged 194c/kg. Heavyweights C3 yearling heifers lifted 11c to average 180c/kg. More grown steers were yarded and heavyweight C3 steers lifted 3c to return 160c to 185c/kg and D3 grown heifers lifted 12c to average 154c/kg lwt.

A much larger cow yarding sold to fluctuating competition, feeders and restockers provided strong bidding on lightweight D2 cows at values from 120c to 139c/kg, D2 pastoral cows returned 100c to 141c and heavyweight D3 cows eased 4c and averaged 133c/kg. Lightweight C2 bulls were in abundance and demand was strong, feeders paid 156c to 187c to secure them and heavyweight B2 lifted 6c and returned 144c to 159c/kg.

**PIGS.** Yarded: 1011. **Quotations:** Trade Pork, 225c/kg to 248c/kg, average 235c/kg (+15); Trade Female Bacon, 215 to 248, average 230(+10); Trade Male Bacon, 190 to 222, average 210 (+10); Secondary Bacon, 160 to 200, average 180 (+10); Sows, firm; Boars, firm.
